Council Meeting

August 1, 2000

9:00 a.m.-Pitts Center

1. Mayor pro tem Denny called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m.
Mayor Sutherland was absent for jury duty.
2. Pledge of Allegiance was led by Dan Shields
3. Moment of Silence

Mayor pro tem Denny asked that a moment of silence be held for the family of Marty Roth, who was a town resident for 20 years and for the family of Marcie Hearst of Martin's Point.

4. Consent Agenda-Minutes-July 5, 2000, Building Inspection Monthly Report, and Monthly Tax Report

Mayor pro tem Denny presented the consent agenda. Councilman Campbell made a motion to approve the consent agenda. Councilman Kennedy seconded. Approved unanimously.

Tom White, Town Attorney, introduced Ike ^{McKel}Lupree as the newest member to the firm of Hornthal, Riley, Ellis, and Maland. He said that Mr. ^{McKel}Lupree had previously been the County attorney for Currituck and Pasquotank and will be locating to Nags Head in the near future.

5. Introduction of new Police Sergeant

Chief Brazell introduced Thad Pledger as a sergeant (administrative) to the department. Chief Brazell stated that Officer Pledger comes to Southern Shores from the Currituck County Sheriff's Department. Officer Pledger stated that he is glad to be a part of the Town and welcomes all to visit him. Mayor pro tem stated that he is glad to have him aboard.

6. Planning Board Report

Jim Morrison, Chairman, submitted the Planning Board report for July 17, 2000. He explained that an error on the estuarine ordinance needs to be amended, which Council will be doing later in the meeting.

Chairman Morrison stated that the Planning Board recommends that Council approve the request from Duck Woods Country Club to allow an accessory maintenance building. He explained that this is a modular trailer but that the axles and tongue would be removed.

Mayor pro tem Denny commented that Mike Hejduk, Code Enforcement Administrator, had a question regarding the state code definition of "modular construction". M. Hejduk stated that he received the sticker information he was looking for and the trailer is approved by state building code.

Councilman Kennedy made a motion to approve the request to place the structure on the Duck Woods Country Club (DWCC) premises as presented. Mayor pro tem Denny seconded.

Councilman Smith had questions regarding the "sticker" and what the difference is between "modular construction" and a manufactured structure? He read the "Off Street Parking" section 6.01 of the zoning ordinance, which states that the Town does not allow trailers. He feels if Council allows DWCC to have this that it would allow others to have trailers also.

M. Hejduk commented that a "superstructure" is defined as a structure that has its axles and tongue removed and it is no longer a trailer in the state building code.

M. Hejduk stated that there are two different standards of trailers and that the Town has manufactured houses that come in, in pieces, but do not have wheels or tongues and that are placed on a foundation.

Councilman Smith read from the submitted Planning Board report where the Board calls the structure a "construction trailer." He asked are we going to allow trailers at the school? He stated that Council is allowing things like parking (which he voted against) for the hotel in Kitty Hawk that is changing the look of the Town and he wants to keep the Town looking as it is.

M. Hejduk agreed that it does look like a trailer but he can not deny the permit as a building code issue. He said that Council did recently change the zoning ordinance to prohibit habitable space in an accessory building.

Councilman Smith said that he did not understand a third party approval. M. Hejduk stated that the sticker from the manufacturer shows that it meets the state building code.

Councilman Smith commented that DWCC should be a good neighbor and build something that is within the code.

M. Hejduk stated that he submitted a letter to DWCC regarding their proposal not meeting the Town's zoning ordinance and their reply was to build something differently would double the cost of the structure.

Chairman Morrison clarified that the "modular construction" standards definition means the axles and tongue are removed. M. Hejduk said that meets state building code.

Councilman Campbell stated that he is aware of problems that DWCC has but they are asking to place a structure not conducive to the neighborhood. They are forcing a standard, not meeting a standard. He commented that if a layman sees it, it looks like a trailer. He suggested that it should have a better appearance.

Councilman Kennedy commented that Council is not an architectural review board. If it meets the state building code and is on the DWCC property and is not visible to the public then it should be approved.

Mayor pro tem Denny asked if anyone from DWCC would like to speak on the issue.

David Kidwell, on the DWCC grounds committee, stated that he also attended the Planning Board meeting. He commented that the structure would be landscaped and that it can only be seen from the school property. He stated that a lot of thought went into this decision and the club feels it has met the Town's zoning requirements.

Councilman Campbell stated the ordinance applies whether the structure is visible or not but he is very disappointed that the DWCC has chosen this type of structure. He had hoped they would change their mind. He stated that he would abstain from voting on this issue.

Planning Board cont'd

Tom White, Town Attorney, read the Town's zoning ordinance identifying the four types of trailers and the definition of a modular home according to the zoning ordinance. He stated that Council may amend the ordinance but they cannot ban these structures. He also stated that an abstention vote is a yes vote.

Dick Furioni, General Manager of DWCC, stated that this project has been ongoing for two years. The employees need a proper place to do their work and this site was selected as an out of the way area. He stated that it is not the intention of the club to put up a building that detracts from the town and that proper shrubbery will be used to help blend it in.

Councilman Smith, once again, read section 6.01 of the zoning ordinance and stated that the Planning Board called it a "construction trailer" and he feels this will only open a can of worms.

Councilman Campbell stated that DWCC is a special area in the Town. He stated that the Southern Shores Civic Association Architectural Review Board has no jurisdiction over the DWCC and that is why Council needs to review the architectural design proposed.

M. Hejduk commented that there are many single-family modular homes in Town but they have siding, skirting, and roof pitch but when you have aluminum siding and a flat top roof then it looks like it is a trailer. He suggested that options might be available for the structure.

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that the Building Inspector had no basis to turn down the structure and even though the Planning Board may be uncomfortable with the structure they made the recommendation. He personally thinks it looks tacky but he can not disallow it. Mayor pro tem Denny made a motion to approve the site plan with the structure as presented. Councilman Kennedy seconded. Two votes for the motion, one abstention-Councilman Campbell and Councilman Smith voting no. Motion passed with two yes votes and one abstention.

7. Public Hearing-Mayor by Popular Vote

Mayor pro tem Denny explained there is a strict schedule to follow in accordance to general statutes in placing the question of allowing the voters to vote for mayor by popular vote on the November ballot.

Mayor pro tem Denny opened the public hearing at 9:45 a.m. and read the proposed ordinance. No one signed up to speak.

Jim Morrison of 38 12th Ave. asked how could a mayor or council be removed from office? Tom White said general statute allows for a declaration of incompetence.

Dan Shields of 44 Eagles Nest asked if there is a concern regarding a term limit for the mayor? Mayor pro tem Denny said not to his knowledge and the term of the mayor would be for four years.

Jim Morrison stated that he has attended every workshop, retreat and meeting regarding this issue and there doesn't seem to be an overwhelming outcry from the citizens to do this. He suggested that before the charter is amended and placed on the ballot that a group is set up to address the pros and cons regarding the issue. He would like Council to vote for the best one to be mayor.

Rose Deacon of 66 E. Dogwood Trail stated that as it stands now the mayor is elected every two years and if the people elect the mayor for a four-year term then the people would have to impeach him.

Dick Furioni of 49 Skyline Drive stated that the present procedure that is in place has been working well but if politics prevail then the one who spends the most money or has the most drive would become mayor. He thinks it should stay the way it is.

Ursula Zdziarski of 267 N. Dogwood Trail suggested that the SSCA General Meeting could be used for a forum to discuss the issue. Councilman Campbell explained that there is a strict time frame to follow and the meeting would not meet the time line.

Mayor pro tem Denny called upon anyone else wishing to speak, hearing none, he closed the public hearing at 10:00 a.m.

8. Old Business

a. Traffic Signal Update

Mayor pro tem Denny reported that the left turn signal on S. Dogwood/ US158 will be installed and will be activated on the first day of school. He also reported that the left turn signal on E. Dogwood has been installed but seems to have a malfunction and has been reported to NCDOT.

b. Long Range Plan Update Committee

Mayor pro tem stated that Council is asking for volunteers to be on the committee. He stated that the plan needs to be updated every five years. Anyone wishing to apply for the committee can pick up a form at Town Hall and return when completed.

c. Set Public Hearing date for Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) and Town zoning map.

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that the draft ordinance has been drawn up by the Town Attorney. The Council and Martin's Point Homeowner's Board have agreed to relinquish the residential area of the ETJ. The Town will continue the ETJ on the commercial zone and the waterway to protect the Town Personal Watercraft Ordinance in Ginguite Creek and Currituck Sound waters. Mayor pro tem made a motion to set the date for the public hearing at the Council's September 5, 2000 meeting at 7:30 p.m. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously.

d. Personal Watercraft Ordinance Amendment

Mayor pro tem Denny reported that Councilman Smith, Councilman Campbell, John Finelli, and Tom Franchi met to discuss the points of consideration to be amended. Councilman Campbell proposed Council review the points at the next Council workshop. Councilman Smith stated that the Town Manager and the Police Chief have had input into the changes.

Councilman Kennedy commented that the residents of the Town and Martin's Point should have access to a public hearing before any final action is taken.

Dan Shields stated that he hopes the changes are made available to the people.

Mayor pro tem Denny asked Mr. Williams to speak.

Old Business cont'd

Rufus Williams of 6061 Martin Point Road stated that he and his family have complied with the PWC ordinance and have dealt with the Police Dept. and have a good rapport with them. He had some suggestions for Council's consideration. He explained that a slower jet ski speed causes more pollution and that a 5-mph ingress/egress may be all right but the speed needs to be increased once it hits the channel. He suggested deleting the course and commented that state does not require one. He suggested re-drawing the creek line and not include Martin's Point. He stated that he understands Council's need to protect the creek but before the ordinance change he could supervise his kids and now he can not. He stated that a law that is made hard to obey makes it hard to be obeyed.

Councilmen Campbell commented that Mr. Williams' arguments are valid and have been considered and some are in the recommended changes.

Councilman Smith stated that the proposed changes are agreeable.

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that no changes will be made during this season.

Tom Gjestson, Town Manager, stated that the Police Department is enforcing the ordinance as it now stands.

Chief Brazell stated that the course can be found on the Internet. Councilman Smith stated the address is www.boatus.com.

9. New Business

a. Estuarine Bulkhead Amendment

Mayor pro tem Denny explained that the estuarine bulkhead ordinance needs to be amended by correcting Section F(7) to be listed as F(8). Councilman Kennedy made the motion to amend the ordinance for the reason stated. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously.

b. Resolution on Littering

Mayor pro tem Denny reported that Chowan County has instigated a resolution to pursue violators of the State littering law. He read the proposed resolution. Councilman Kennedy made a motion to adopt the resolution as presented. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously.

Councilmen Kennedy stated that the Town also has an ordinance prohibiting litter.

New Business cont'd

Chief Brazell commented that since there was a state campaign against littering, penalties have been increased.

Tony Sylvester asked if the Town is endorsing the state policy. Mayor pro tem said yes. Chief Brazell stated the Town charges whatever the state fine is.

Andy Cagiano asked if you see someone littering what is the procedure to have them arrested? Chief Brazell said that if you could give the license number of the car and you are willing to be a witness and go to court, then the Police Department would follow through.

Bob Deacon stated that 90% of the trash/litter on the roadside is coming from County trash trucks and residents trash cans.

Mayor pro tem Denny asked if you see debris coming from a car and you get the license number you can report it? Chief Brazell said that the report needs to be for that day, you can't wait and report a day or more later.

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that the Town Attorney, Tom White, needs to leave but that Mr. Lupree will sit in.

Lupree
c. Surplus Items

Tom Gjestson reported the staff is putting together an inventory list of surplus items and Chief Brazell will submit to Council at the September workshop.

d. Establish committee to study traffic problems

Councilman Campbell reported that NCDOT held a meeting of selected people to discuss the traffic problems at the intersection of NC12 and US Hwy 158 in front of Town Hall. He recommended that a traffic study committee be set up to review and present options. Approved unanimously.

e. Millennium Fireworks

Mayor pro tem Denny reported that the Dare County Tourism Bureau will once again provide a grant of \$10,000 to \$15,000 for a millennium fireworks celebration for January 2001. Councilman Campbell made a motion the Town Manger apply for and accept the grant as presented. Councilman Smith seconded. Approved unanimously.

New Business cont'd

f. Board of Adjustment Reappointment

Mayor pro tem Denny announced that Jack Bradley of the Board of Adjustment term has expired and that he has agreed to continue on the Board. Councilman Kennedy made a motion to reappoint Jack Bradley to the Board of Adjustment for a three year term. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously. Mayor pro tem Denny also stated that Mr. Bradley's chairmanship of one year has expired and that Council needs to reappoint him for that position. Councilman Campbell made a motion to reappoint Jack Bradley for a one year chairmanship to the Board of Adjustment. Councilman Smith seconded. Approved unanimously.

g. Proposed Roller Skate, In-Line Skates and Skateboarding Ordinance

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that this proposed ordinance has some concern by Council. He read the ordinance. Councilman Campbell made a motion to adopt the ordinance as presented. Councilman Kennedy seconded. (See attached)

Councilman Smith stated that he has a number of issues with this ordinance. He questioned the term *coaster* and wanted to know what it meant in section (1) of the ordinance. Chief Brazell said that it meant something like a soap box derby. Councilman Smith said that he did not understand section (4).

Councilman Kennedy explained that a person can use skates on the Town multi-use path but not on NC 12 or Hwy 158 except at intersections.

Councilman Smith stated that he finds section (5) prohibiting the use from sunset to sunrise as picking on the younger kids in Town. He stated that his son uses his skateboard to travel to friend's houses at night and this type of martial law does not set well with him.

Councilman Smith stated that section (6) is picking on roller bladders and skateboarders. He stated "why not say any person or vehicle acting in a reckless manner will be penalized"?

Mayor pro tem Denny stated that this is the roller blade, skateboard, etc. ordinance and that is within the ordinance, not for someone walking or driving vehicles.

David Sanders asked does this mean emergency vehicles can't park on the path?
Mayor pro tem Denny said no.

New Business cont'd

Councilman Smith stated if Council would agree to strike section (5) *sunset to sunrise* from the ordinance then he would have no problem with it.

Councilman Kennedy stated that this proposed ordinance does not apply to walkers and bicyclist and he thinks the ordinance should remain as presented.

Councilman Smith asked are we trying to ban them after dark or are we trying to be safe?

Chief Brazell stated that the Town doesn't allow skateboarding now and there are no requirements that skateboarders wear reflective clothing.

Councilman Smith stated that people walking at night is also a safety hazard and he feels the Town is over regulating, in his opinion.

Andy Cagiano commented that it is hard for drivers to see skateboarders coming down the Hillcrest area and that area may need to be addressed separately.

Councilman Campbell stated that the ordinance should be given a chance as presented. Mayor pro tem Denny called for a vote. 3 to 1 in favor. Councilman Smith voting no. Approved.

10. Public Comment

Ann Kaplan, 3044 Martin's Point, asked for Council's help or direction regarding a neighbor placing what she called the "great wall" on the property line. She submitted pictures and explained that she has been in constant contact with Mike Hejduk, Town Code Enforcement Administrator. She explained that Mr. Hejduk put a stop work order on the job but the neighbor has proceeded in spite of it.

Mayor pro tem Denny asked M. Hejduk if a stop work order was being violated? M. Hejduk explained that verbally the owner agreed to stop but did not and that he then issued a second stop work order. Mayor pro tem Denny stated that the matter needs to remain in the office of the code enforcement.

George Wells of 197 Duck Road commented that people using bikes or other means than walking on the multi-use path and approaching pedestrians should be required to give some type of warning.

Public Comment cont'd

Elsa Edwards of 56 Periwinkle Place stated that she has lived in Town since 1977 and she has seen the polifercation of traffic on NC 12. She stated that she recently drove to Corolla and upon seeing Caffey's Inlet she realized how difficult it would be to evacuate if the inlet were broached and for these reasons alone the bridge at Corolla is imperative.

Al Smith of 279 Sea Oats Trail stated that while he was driving on Duck Rd/Ocean Blvd. three bicyclist were on the road and it was very dangerous. He stated that they should be made to use the multi-use path. Mayor pro tem Denny stated that signs would be posted on the path soon but they would not be addressing bikes.

Ursula Zdziarski reported that she has seen cars using the bike path to pass. Chief Brazell said the Police Dept is aware of this practice and are watching carefully for violators.

11. Council's Agenda

Councilman Smith commented that something needs to be done about the traffic situation and that there was even an article in the Va. Pilot recently. He suggested that Senator Marc Basnight be contacted about the need for the bridge in Corolla and not let this be passed over.

Councilman Campbell reported that the renovation on the Pitts Center is moving along and he is hopeful that it would finished soon. He explained that new fire codes apply since the building is now an assembly building and that is why the renovations are being made and to have a presentable room for meetings.

Councilman Kennedy-none

Councilman Denny addressed Mrs. Aukland's request regarding the need for a multi-use path on S. Dogwood. He stated that he agrees but it would be very costly (as much as 4 times as the one on NC 12 and that could not be used as a model).

Mayor's Agenda-none

Town Manager's Agenda

Tom Gjestson reviewed the time frame needed to submit the 'mayor by popular vote' information to the County Board of Elections.

Town Manager's Agenda cont'd

Tom Gjestson explained that the North Carolina League of Municipalities has requested that Council approve a ballot allowing the League to amend the IRFFNC Interlocal Risk Management Service agreement. This change allows funds protected by General Statute to operate under the Interlocal Cooperation statute for local governments and not under the Insurance law. Councilman Kennedy made a motion for the ballot to be returned in support of the request. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously.

Police Chief Brazell gave the monthly police report.

Fire Chief Bakken gave the monthly fire report.

Tom Gjestson reported that the figures for the June occupancy tax were down by \$12,000 from last year. Statistics are \$85,000 for 1999 and \$73,000 for 2000.



PLANNING BOARD MEETING RECAP

7/18/00

Prepared by Jim Morrison for Council Workshop 7/25/00

1. Duck Woods Country Club submitted a site plan for a maintenance office building on their site near the county water tower, close to their other maintenance buildings. "Golf Clubs" are a conditional use in the R-1 zoning district.

The building is actually a construction trailer, towed to the site, however the wheels and tongue are removed and the unit is placed and secured on a concrete slab. This technically makes it a modular building rather than a trailer. Since trailers are not permitted in the R-1 district, this was a key point of discussion with the Club. Additionally, the location is not highly visible by the public nor is it a building for public use.

They have received county approval to serve this facility with their existing septic system.

"The Planning Board recommends to Council that the existing conditional use permit be amended to allow the construction of a one story Maintenance Office building at the Duck Woods Country Club as shown on the site plan presented at the July 17 Planning Board meeting."

2. Progress was reported, however no proposals are ready for Council on Telecommunication Towers, Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance amendments, nor RS-10 (Mallard Cove) non-conformity issues.

WHEREAS, roadside litter is becoming a mounting problem in Northeastern North Carolina, and indeed, the State of North Carolina; AND



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CHARTER OF THE TOWN OF
SOUTHERN SHORES TO PROVIDE FOR THE ELECTION OF THE
MAYOR BY VOTE OF THE ELECTORATE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Southern Shores, North Carolina, that the Charter of the Town of Southern Shores be amended pursuant to Article 5, Part 4 of Chapter 160A of the North Carolina General Statutes as follows:

PART I. Chapter III, Sect. 3-4 of the Charter of the Town of Southern Shores as enacted in Chapter 203 of the 1979 Session Laws of North Carolina is amended by deleting the existing paragraph and inserting the following new paragraphs under the existing heading:

“Pursuant to Article 5, Part 4 of Chapter 160A of the North Carolina General Statutes, the mayor shall be elected by all the qualified voters of the Town to serve a term of four (4) years. The mayor so elected shall have the right to vote on all matters before the town council and shall not have the right to break a tie vote in which the mayor participated.

The first mayoral election shall occur in the November 2001 general election and the person so elected shall take office on the first regularly scheduled meeting of the town council in December of 2001.”

PART II. This Ordinance amending the Town Charter to provide for the election of the Mayor by the qualified voters of the Town shall become effective only if approved by a vote of the qualified voters of the town at the general election held on the 1st Tuesday in November, 2000.

PART III. If approved by the electorate this ordinance amending the town charter shall become effective on the first day of the month following certification by the Dare County Board of Elections of the approval of the amendment.

Adopted subject to approval of the qualified voters this the 5th day of September, 2000.
