Council Meeting
January 7, 2003
7:00 p.m.-Pitts Center

1. Mayor Sutherland called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.
2. Mayor Sutherland led the Pledge of Allegiance
3. Moment of Silence

Mayor Sutherland asked that a moment of silence be held for the families of John Adams, Elinor Coates, Peter Baranowski, Jean Snow, Paul Oswald, Marjorie Charlton, Irmgard Kamphann, Myron Chamberlin, Marion Heller, and all those serving in the military and other government service that could be involved in Iraq in the future.

4. Public Comment

Pat Storey, 362 Sea Oats Trail presented Council with the 2003 League of Women Voter's Annual Citizen's Guide to Dare County. She thanked Council for their contribution each year that is used in publishing the guide. She stated that the towns of Kill Devil Hills, Kitty Hawk and Nags Head have also agreed to contribute funds to be used towards the guide.

She also thanked Councilman Campbell for his efforts in contacting the Government Access Channel requesting support that the League of Women Voter's "Candidates Night" be televised on the government access channel. She stated that the League is pursuing this request.

Ray Sharp, 46 Fairway Drive thanked Council for all their efforts. He stated that he has a concern that he would like Council to consider. His concern is the proliferation of nutria (muskrat) in the canals. He stated that they are very destructive to the waterways.

Councilman Campbell stated that Council would add his concern for discussion at Council retreat.

5. Consent Agenda-December 3, 2002 minutes, monthly Building Inspections report, and monthly Tax report. Mayor Sutherland read highlights of the Building Inspections report. Councilman Campbell made a motion to approve the consent agenda as submitted. Councilman Smith seconded. Approved unanimously.

6. Presentations

a. Dare County Larvicide Program

Tim McGonegal, Dare County Vector Control Manager presented to Council a mosquito control larvicide program as part of an integrated mosquito management plan. He gave a very informational presentation and followed up by asking Council to consider designating individuals to aid him in the larviciding process. He stated that the County would provide the chemicals and equipment and he would train the individuals who would work under his license.

Councilman Kennedy asked how the canals and ponds in Town would affect the program? T. McGonegal stated that mosquitoes are not attracted to moving water and there is a mosquito fish that eats the larvae that could be stocked in those areas.

Councilman Smith asked what the time frame would be for the maps to be completed that would determine the breeding areas? T. McGonegal stated that they should be ready by February.

T. McGonegal stated that public information is being displayed on Channel 20 regarding this plan.

Fire Chief Bakken asked what the incubation time is for larvae in standing water? T. McGonegal stated 5 days and that 1 female can lay 150-200 eggs.

Mayor Sutherland asked if the larvicide program is a substitute for the spraying. T. McGonegal stated no that in an aggressive program both are used. He explained that the spraying is to rid the adult mosquitoes.

Mayor Sutherland stated that he is sure the Town can provide volunteers and he asked T. McGonegal to contact the Town Manager to set up the program. Mayor Sutherland also asked anyone wishing to volunteer to contact Town Hall.

Mike Hejduk, Town Code Enforcement Administrator asked how it is proposed to go onto private property? T. McGonegal stated that is still being discussed but that it is for a public health issue.

Todd Maris suggested that T. McGonegal contact the Science teacher at the high school about using seniors as interns for the mosquito control program.

b. Outer Banks Community Development Corporation (non-profit) -Todd Maris. He stated that the purpose of the OBCDC is to develop housing for low and moderate-income citizens, and provide related economic, social and educational services. He is asking Council tonight to consider a \$5,000 contribution and to provide a Council member to join the committee. He stated that he would be addressing all the municipalities and that the County would be providing support.

Presentations cont'd

Mayor Sutherland stated that it is a noble effort and that Council would support the cause by providing volunteers and whatever in-kind support could be given but that Council is restricted in donating funds. He suggested that a broadcast email be sent to solicit volunteers.

8. Public Hearing-Draft amendment to Town Code regarding solicitation.

Mayor Sutherland called the public hearing to order at 7:35 p.m. No one signed up to speak.

Mayor Sutherland gave a review of the proposed amendment and stated what precipitated the amendment was a door-to-door solicitation made by a political group in Town.

Mayor Sutherland closed the public hearing.

Councilman Campbell made a motion to adopt the ordinance change as presented. Mayor Sutherland seconded. Approved unanimously.

9. Planning Board Recap-December 16, 2002

Chairman Dan Shields presented a site plan (dated 9/16/02) from Southern Shores Realty (5 Ocean Blvd.) with a request for an addition to the existing structure. Chairman Shields stated that after review the Planning Board unanimously recommends Council approve the site plan as presented.

Councilman Denny moved to approve the submitted site as recommended by the Planning Board. Councilman Campbell seconded. Approved unanimously.

10. Resolutions

a. First Flight Stamp

Councilman Campbell made a motion to adopt the resolutions as presented. Mayor Sutherland seconded. Approved unanimously.

b. Early Voting for the Northern Beaches

Mayor Sutherland stated that the Dare County Board of Elections allowed the program of early voting in Manteo at the Board of Elections and it was suggested that the program be made available to the northern beaches and Hatteras Island.

Mayor Sutherland made a motion to adopt the resolution as presented. Councilman Kennedy seconded. Approved unanimously.

11. Old Business

a. Mid-Currituck Bridge Update

Mayor Sutherland stated that signatures on the petition now total (11,000+). He stated that there is a proposal for a large sign to be posted on NC 12 explaining the Blue Ribbon campaign to support the building of the bridge.

He stated that David Stick supports the campaign and signed the petition.

He stated that a financial study is being prepared to include the impact of multi-lanning of roads. The study is under the direction of John Wander of Duck and there is a need for volunteers. He asked that anyone wishing to help contact Town Hall.

b. Retreat dates-January 23 and 24, 2003

Mayor Sutherland stated that the list of retreat items is published in the Town newsletter. He invited the public to attend the retreat.

Councilman Campbell stated that Mr. Sharp's request regarding the nutria would be added to the retreat list.

12. New Business

a. David Stick dedication

Mayor Sutherland thanked Councilman Campbell and Kennedy for all the preparation to make the dedication a success.

Councilman Campbell stated that the weather was beautiful and David was surprised and appreciative of the efforts.

13. Council's Agenda

Councilman Smith called upon Fire Chief Bakken to give a report.

Chief Bakken gave a year end report. He also stated that the department needs a john boat to aid them in the marsh burn to be held in April if anyone has one available.

Councilman Kennedy stated that Council appointed a sign committee to review the posting of uniform parking/no parking signs on the avenues. He presented a diagram of the placement of the signs.

He stated that he would be attending an RPO meeting on January 9 at which time the results of the public hearing held on the draft DOT TIP would be released.

Council's Agenda cont'd

Councilman Kennedy stated that his nomination to the Tourist Bureau has been approved and he would report as warranted.

He stated that there was a plane crash in Manteo at Christmas time and the pilot is still missing and that the Civil Air Patrol under the direction of Councilman Denny has been continuously searching. Councilman Denny stated that the search would continue, as long the Coast Guard would allow.

Councilman Denny stated that he is pleased that Councilman Kennedy shared that info and that the Civil Air Patrol are a fine group of volunteers.

He stated that the bid package is ready for the multi-use path on Juniper Trail and Gersen Path repairs for January 10th. He stated that due to the holiday schedule the bids would be accepted and opened on January 22.

Councilman Kennedy asked if street repairs are being completed? Councilman Denny stated yes and that there are 3-4 projects completed. He stated that warm days are needed to pour asphalt and it may be February before completed.

Councilman Campbell reported that Charter Communication's broad band Internet service would be completed by January 16. This service, by contract, offers municipality public buildings to have free access to the Internet.

He stated that four universities including John Hopkins would be sending representatives to discuss the use of the Pitts Center for wind studies.

14. Mayor's Agenda

Mayor Sutherland complimented the Town staff for their efforts on the Volunteer Luncheon. He stated that there were over 100 in attendance.

15. Town Manager's Agenda

- ◆ Tom Gjestson stated that a resident had told him that signs on the beach stating "Welcome to Southern Shores" has been missing for some time. He stated that new 'welcome' signs have been posted at the northern and southern ends of the beach by Doug Apple of the SSCA and he thanked them for their help.
- ◆ Announced that the Employee Recognition dinner would be held Saturday.
- ◆ Announced that the sign over the Pitts Center has been repainted.
- ◆ Announced that the Vegetation Committee applied for a grant and after some follow-up it is learned that the grant is forthcoming.

Town Manager's Agenda cont'd

- ◆ MAPS Study (personnel and pay study) is ongoing and findings should be submitted to Council at the March meeting.

Police Chief Pledger announced that the Town of Kill Devil Hills has applied for a \$76,000 grant that would allow video conferences to be held with the County Magistrate and swear out pre warrants that would save time in Officers going to Manteo. He stated that the Town's share of the grant would be \$3827.00 for the next fiscal year.

T. Gjestson asked Council to approve the share of the grant as a budget item for FY 2003-2004 and not to exceed \$5,000 and a monthly payment of \$69.00. Councilman Campbell moved to approve the grant requested as presented by the Town Manager. Councilman Kennedy seconded. Approved unanimously.

16. Town Attorney's Agenda-none



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RESOLUTION

TOWN OF SOUTHERN SHORES EARLY VOTING FOR THE NORTHERN BEACHES

WHEREAS, voting is the lifeblood of democracy. It is the purest form of participation in government and should be encouraged whenever possible, and

WHEREAS, early voting capability during the general elections currently exists only at the Board of Elections location in Manteo, and

WHEREAS, this early voting opportunity serves the citizens of Dare County well, and

WHEREAS, use of this early voting capability by the citizens of Dare County in the 2002 elections was very popular, and

WHEREAS, the vast preponderance of eligible voters reside on the northern Outer Banks and a significant number reside on Hatteras Island. They must travel to Manteo to exercise early voting and because of the length of the trip required may discourage some that would otherwise vote, and

WHEREAS, establishment of an early voting capability on the northern Outer Banks and Hatteras Island would encourage a greater turn out of voters and particularly be valuable for those that have conflicts on election day, and

WHEREAS, an increase in voter turnout could well be stimulated by additional early voting locations

WHEREAS, several county owned locations exist on the northern Outer Banks and Hatteras Island that could easily serve as early voting locations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town of Southern Shores endorses and supports extension of the early voting capability, such as that existing in Manteo; be established at suitable locations on the Northern Outer Banks and on Hatteras Island.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Town Council of Southern Shores does hereby request that the Dare County Board of Elections establish sites for one-stop absentee voting on the northern beaches and Hatteras Island and the Dare County Board of Commissioners provide any additional funds needed for this program.

LOCATION TO ISSUE THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF FLIGHT COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

WHEREAS, the Outer Banks of North Carolina is the home of the first powered flight at Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina on the 17th of December 1903,

WHEREAS, Orville and Wilber Wright were the architects of the plane that made that flight and they were the ones that conducted that momentous flight in North Carolina,

WHEREAS, the 100th anniversary of the First Flight at Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina will be celebrated on 17 December 2003 at Kill Devil Hills with a gala ceremony and massive fly over,

WHEREAS, the U. S Postal Service has scheduled the release of a new stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of flight,

WHEREAS, the location for the issue of the First Flight 100th Anniversary of Flight Commemorative stamp has not yet been announced,

WHEREAS, the perfect location for first day issuance is the place where the momentous flight by the Wright Brothers took place – Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Council and the citizens of the Town of Southern Shores support the location for the first day of issue of the aforementioned stamp to be Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that the Post Master General of the United States schedule the first day of issue in the Town of Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina on the 17th of December 2003.

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Post Master General, Senator John Edwards, Senator Elizabeth Dole and Congressman Walter Jones.

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Ordinance #03-01-025

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN SHORES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Council for the Town of Southern Shores that Chapter 6, Article II **Nuisances**, Sec. 6-26(7) of the Southern Shores Town Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

(7) *Solicitation, etc.* The following acts are considered a public nuisance and are not permitted within the corporate limits: Peddling, begging, soliciting or collecting.

a. This paragraph shall not apply to:

- i. The delivery of goods or services which have been ordered before delivery;
- ii. The circulation of petitions for signature or lawful distribution of advertising materials, flyers, or materials expressing views on political, social or religious matters;
- iii. The lawful promotion or expression of views concerning political, social, religious and other like matters;
- iv. The sale or offering for sale of goods, wares, merchandise, food, periodicals or services by bona fide members or representatives of charitable, religious, civic, or fraternal organizations which are exempt from the payment of privilege licenses, and who receive no compensation of any kind for their services, and such sale or offering by children under the age of eighteen (18) years who are students in a public or private school for school activities;
- v. The sale or delivery of goods to business establishments.

b. It is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to solicit charitable contributions by going from door-to-door within the town without having first secured a solicitor's permit from the town as provided below. Additionally, it is unlawful to solicit for charitable contributions unless the following requirements are met:

i. Solicitation of charitable contributions shall be permitted only between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. during Eastern Daylight Time and 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. during Eastern Standard Time.

ii. The solicitor permit issued for that person shall be carried and displayed at all times while conducting such solicitations in such a manner as to be clearly visible to a reasonable person of adequate vision.

iii. All other permits or licenses required by law shall have been obtained.

c. *Permit applications.* Applications for permits to solicit charitable contributions shall be submitted to the police department during normal business hours (Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Eastern Time) on a form provided by the police department, under oath, and shall include, but not be limited to, the following information:

i. The full name of the applicant;

ii. The permanent residence address of the applicant;

iii. The applicant's temporary address in or in the vicinity of the town, if applicable;

iv. The name and address of the applicant's employer or the organization with which the applicant is associated in connection with the solicitation of charitable contributions;

v. The period for which the application is sought, which shall not exceed sixty (60) consecutive calendar days; provided that the permit may be renewed for sixty-day periods without limit, upon proper application therefor;

vi. A record of any and all crimes of which the applicant has been convicted or has pleaded no contest in the ten (10) years preceding the submittal of the application;

vii. The age, height, weight, and any other additional information which the town may reasonably require for identification, including a copy of the document(s) used by the applicant to verify personal identification (e.g. driver's license, passport, picture I.D.);

viii. A complete listing of and information concerning all other permits or licenses, such as privilege licenses, which were obtained by the applicant.

ix. Documentation that the organization for which charitable contributions are to be solicited is a nonprofit and tax exempt entity.

If an application is filed by an employer, there shall also be filed separate applications for each solicitor giving the information set forth above for each solicitor and signed and sworn to by each solicitor, and a separate permit shall be issued for each applicant.

d. *Procedures for considering applications.*

i. Upon receipt of a complete application, the police chief or designee (hereafter "police chief") shall make or cause to be made such investigation as reasonably necessary to verify the information in the application and to assure compliance with the provisions of this section and shall issue a permit unless the applicant:

- (1) Has not submitted a completed application;
- (2) Is not permitted by law to engage in such activity due to age;
- (3) Has been convicted of, or has pleaded no contest to, a felony charge within the ten (10) years preceding the submittal of the application;
- (4) Has been, within the previous five (5) years, convicted of, or pleaded no contest to, a misdemeanor charge involving theft, fraud, forging, uttering, or other crimes of like nature or any crime involving moral turpitude;
- (5) Does not have valid driving privileges in the state in those case where the applicant will be operating a vehicle

in the course and scope of the soliciting for charitable contributions; or

(6) Has not obtained the necessary licenses.

ii. The police chief shall approve or deny an application and issue a permit as soon as possible and, except in the case of extraordinary circumstances, as when a number of applications are submitted within a short period of time, should act within seventy-two (72) hours of receipt of the completed application. Such issued permit shall be nontransferable.

iii. *Permit renewal.* A permit for solicitation of charitable contributions may be renewed for an unlimited number of sixty-day periods, provided an application for renewal is made on such form as provided by the police chief no later than the expiration date on the current valid permit. Applications received after that date shall be processed as new applications. The police chief shall review each application for renewal to determine that the applicant is in full compliance with the provisions of this section. If the police department finds that the application meets the above requirements, the renewal permit shall be issued.

iv. *Appeals.* The appeal of a refusal to issue a permit or the revocation of a permit shall be made to the town manager by filing a written notice of appeal, specifying with particularity the grounds upon which the appeal is made, no later than ten (10) days from the date of the refusal to issue a permit or the revocation of a permit. The town manager or designee ("town manager") shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal, shall give due notice to all parties, and shall render a decision within a reasonable time. The order or decision of the town manager shall be final municipal action.

v. *Revocation of permit.* Permits issued under this section may be revoked where evidence is presented that the applicant has been arrested for a felony or a misdemeanor involving theft, fraud, forgery, moral turpitude, criminal trespass, or a threat to the public safety during the solicitation period, or has otherwise violated the provisions of this section. A permit which has been revoked shall be immediately surrendered to the police department. Appeals of revocations may be made pursuant to the same process as for denied permits.

e. Licenses or permits; refusal to issue, suspension, revocation; notice, hearing.

i. The town may refuse to issue a license or permit, or the licenses or permits issued pursuant to this Code, unless otherwise provided hereunder, may be suspended or revoked by the town manager or other authorized official, department, board or agency where applicable, after notice and hearing for any of the following causes:

(1) Any fraud, misrepresentations or false statements contained in the application for permit or license;

(2) Any fraud, misrepresentation or false statement made in connection with the selling of goods, wares, merchandise and services;

(3) Any violation of this section and/or any ordinance of the town;

(4) Conviction of the applicant, licensee or permittee of any crime or misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or a violation of any act of this state, or any law of the United States having a reasonable relationship to the purpose and scope of the permit or license;

(5) Conducting the activity under this Code and/or any ordinance of the town in an unlawful manner or in such a manner as to constitute a breach of the peace or to constitute a menace to the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public.

ii. Notice of hearing for the suspension or revocation of a license or permit shall be in writing given by the town clerk, setting forth specifically the grounds of the complaint and the time and place of the hearing. Service of such notice shall be made either by personal service or by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the applicant, licensee or permittee at the last known address, at least five (5) days prior to the date set for the hearing.

iii. In case of refusal to issue a permit or license or the suspension or revocation of a license or permit as herein provided, no portion of the application, license or permit fee shall be returned to the applicant, licensee or permittee unless otherwise provided in this section and/or any ordinance of the town.

iv. Any suspension or revocation hereunder shall not be considered a recovery or penalty so as to bar any other penalty from being enforced.

v. The order of the town manager or other authorized official, department, board or agency where applicable, shall be the final municipal action for the purpose of judicial review.
